

The SCIP database (Substances of Concern In articles as such or in complex objects – Products) was introduced under the EU Waste Framework Directive (2008/98/EC, Article 9(1)(i)) to increase transparency regarding substances of very high concern (SVHC) in products. Since 2021, companies have been required to submit relevant information to the database managed by the European Chemicals Agency (ECHA). Although there are discussions at the EU level under the Omnibus Directives to abolish the SCIP database, as long as no decision has been made, the obligation to report products containing SVHCs remains in force. Non-compliance may still result in substantial penalties. The primary objective of the SCIP database is to inform stakeholders in the waste and recycling sectors about SVHC-containing articles at an early stage, thereby supporting safe recycling processes and the substitution of hazardous substances.

This seminar explains the legal framework of SCIP reporting, outlines the data requirements, and demonstrates how these obligations are connected to REACH communication across the supply chain.
